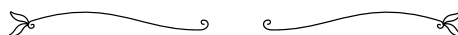
Library Awards & Scholarship

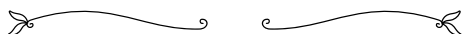

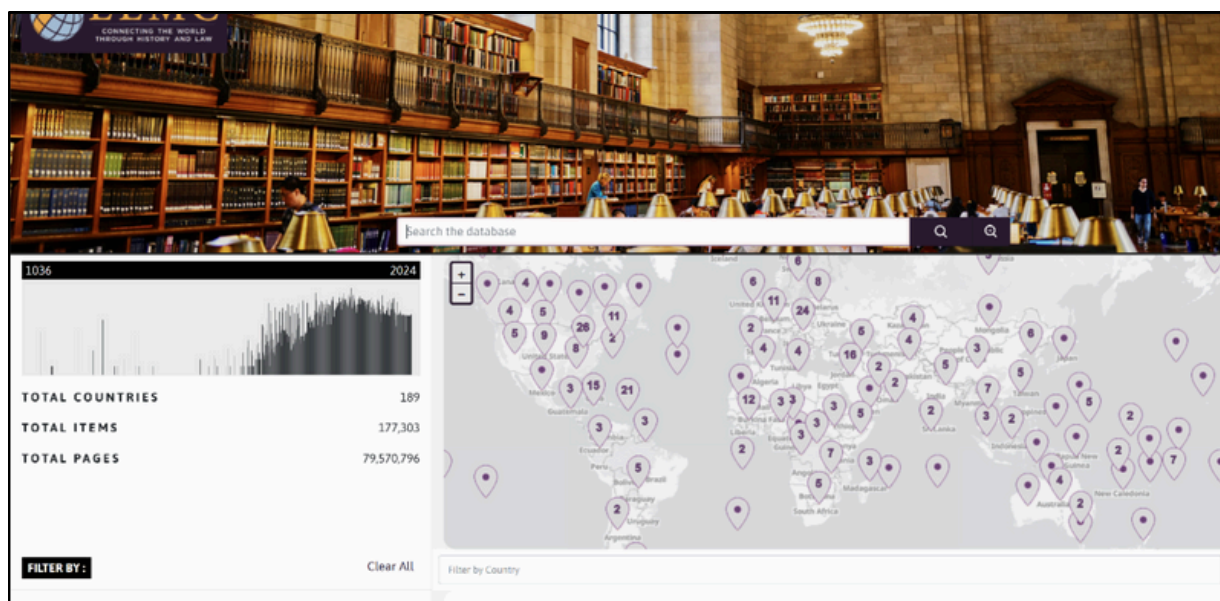
